Funding Approved for Construction of North Carolina Cancer Hospital

Governor Mike Easley visited UNC Hospitals on August 5th to sign the bill passed by the General Assembly to build the new North Carolina Cancer Hospital in Chapel Hill. The new hospital will also serve as the clinical home for the UNC Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center, one of only 38 such National Cancer Institute-designated centers in the United States.

Faculty, staff, patients as well as members of the General Assembly were in attendance to celebrate this important moment. Chancellor Moeser pledged to the group that UNC would build a state-of-the-art facility to meet the needs of people from all around the state.

The Governor expressed his gratitude to the General Assembly for passing this bill saying, "The people need it. The people deserve it." His close friend, Rick Hendrick, owner of Hendrick Automotive and Nascar Motorsports, talked about his battle with cancer and the struggle some families go through to find the proper care for loved ones afflicted with the disease. He hopes the NC Cancer Hospital will attract not only North Carolinians, but people from throughout the nation searching for state-of-the-art treatments in cancer.

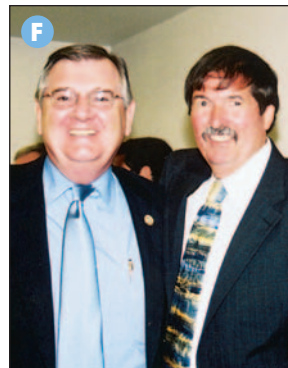
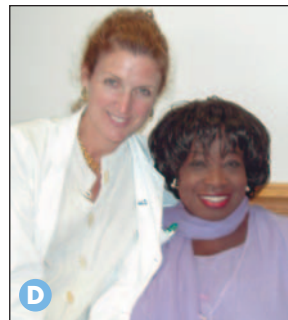

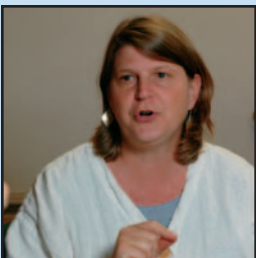

Director's Message

August was a wonderful month for UNC Lineberger and UNC Health Care. As a result of the efforts and energy of many many people, Governor Mike Easley visited UNC on August 5 to sign House Bill 1264 authorizing funding for the new

North Carolina Cancer Hospital. He was surrounded by cancer patients and in front of a crowd that spilled out in the hallways. The legislative leaders who believed in the cause and made the hospital a reality were all there.

Fast on the heels of that excellent news was a call the next day from the National Cancer Institute informing us that our priority score for our core grant proposal—the money to fund the cancer center for the next five years—was in the outstanding range. To be more precise, a score of 136—with perfect being 100 and not so perfect being 500. To put this number in context, this score is one of the best ever awarded to a university-based comprehensive cancer center. To say the least, we can be very proud of our faculty, staff and university. And while our priority score is outstanding, how the score translates into an actual budget is something we will not know until next year. We will keep you informed as we know more.

Both these events mean so much to our patients and families and to our faculty and staff. The National Cancer Institute's evaluation confirms that what we have developed over the past five years and plan to accomplish in the next five years is what a leading comprehensive cancer center should be.

We have successfully recruited nationally known senior leadership to the center: Rich Goldberg as the new associate director for clinical research and Barbara

Rimer as deputy director for population sciences. We have attracted a cadre of bright, young physician-scientists and dedicated clinicians who maximize our successful multidisciplinary approach to cancer care and who take observations from the clinic back to their labs to develop solutions. As a result of the popularity of our multidisciplinary approach, our patient numbers are increasing.

We have increased the number of patients enrolling in innovative clinical trials, stretching the boundaries of options for therapy. We continue our efforts to increase the number of minority patients participating in these trials. Our young scientists continue to win prestigious national awards, acknowledging their scientific leadership and potential. And the designation as a GI Specialized Program of Research Excellence by the National Cancer Institute, one of only four GI SPOREs in the country, reinforces the regard in which the UNC program is held as does the award of one of two national Prostate Cancer Centers of Excellence from the Department of Defense. You'll read more about the DoD grant in this issue and the GI SPORE in the spring issue of *Cancer Lines*.

Over the next five years, we will increase shared facilities that make the conduct of research easier and better. These range from high tech cores to perform millions of genotyping reactions that may help us understand why some patients respond to or have an adverse reaction to chemotherapy, all the way to a core infrastructure for disseminating best practices for prevention to the far flung communities of North Carolina.

We cannot adequately thank the people who effectively communicated the need for the new cancer hospital to the NC Legislature that came together to approve funding construction. Our patients most eloquently made the case for the cancer hospital.

One took her son, a leukemia patient

treated at UNC, to Raleigh to talk to House members about her family's experience at UNC and why she was so fervently in favor of their appropriation of funds to build the hospital. Others wrote

or called their Senators and Representatives to share their stories. Some of our most effective advocates were legislators themselves who had firsthand experience with our wonderful cancer care teams operating in inadequate facilities.

Our Board of Visitors was in the lead for making the case for the new hospital, while Tom Lambeth, director of the Tar Heel Network, a group of UNC-Chapel Hill alumni across the state, activated their more than 1200 members to show their support of the hospital.

We thank Senator and President Pro Tem Marc Basnight and Majority Leader Senator Tony Rand and House Speakers Jim Black and Richard Morgan, as well as our Orange County delegation of Representatives Joe Hackney, Verla Insko and Senator Ellie Kinnaird, for their dedicated work to develop the bill that Governor Easley signed.

And now the plans can be finalized and construction can commence. Mary Beck, senior vice president of planning for UNC Health Care and herself a cancer survivor, organized more than 50 committees of physicians, staff and patients to plan the new facilities, using their experience and expertise to shape the building most effectively to their needs. These groups have been meeting over the past year and a half to offer counsel and ideas as the plans were developed.

The new hospital will allow us to reach out across the state more effectively through partnering with referring physicians and communities to conduct clinical trials, develop effective cancer prevention strategies and offer patients the best possible therapy for their cancer.

In this issue we recognize and thank our donors whose steadfast support of UNC Lineberger allows us to better our patient services and care and explore more promising avenues of discovery. Thank you for your gifts and your faith in our programs. ●

UNC Lineberger Prostate Cancer Research: From Causes to Recurrent Disease

UNC Lineberger faculty are exploring prostate cancer from its inception to recurrence. Their research ranges from North Carolina to Louisiana and includes screening, decision making about therapy, making some surgery less invasive and the efficacy of a therapy for recurrent cancer.

Lineberger researchers are conducting a \$9.9 million study to learn why prostate cancer deaths are more than twice as common in black men as in white men, and why prostate cancer death rates vary significantly from state to state. The study, funded by a three-year grant from the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) Prostate Cancer Research Program, is led by a consortium of top U.S. cancer researchers.

“Prostate cancer is the most common cancer in men and the second leading cause of cancer mortality in the United States,” explains James Mohler, the consortium’s director and a Lineberger member. Mohler holds joint appointments at the UNC School of Medicine as an adjunct associate professor of surgery and pathology, and at the Roswell Park Cancer Institute in Buffalo, N.Y. as professor and chairman of the department of urologic oncology. “The DoD study addresses a critical problem in prostate cancer today.”

The study is one of several UNC-based initiatives investigating prostate cancer. From basic science to environmental factors, Lineberger researchers are searching for ways to develop new and more effective preventions, screenings, and treatments that improve cancer care and enhance quality of life.

Investigating Racial and Geographic Differences

The DoD study will help researchers understand more about the relation between prostate cancer and race and geography.

The prostate cancer death rate for African-American men over 65 is 2.3 times that of Caucasian men; the rate for men under 65 is 3.1 times higher. The investigation focuses on North Carolina, which has the highest prostate cancer mortality rate among African Americans, and Louisiana, which has one of the lowest.

The team will interview 500 African-American men and 500 Caucasian men in the two states and collect and analyze both blood and fat samples. Mohler hopes the DoD study will help researchers understand if mortality rates are affected by host biology or the prostate cancer itself.

It also will help create better health care policy. “The DoD project will allow us to determine where health care resources should be best focused to eliminate the racial gap in prostate cancer mortality,” Mohler notes.

Joining him and the Roswell Park Cancer Center group is a team of investigators at Louisiana State University Health Sciences Center; Harvard, Johns

Hopkins, Boston and Wake Forest universities; the universities of South Carolina and California at Irvine; and the National Cancer Institute, the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

Reducing the Survival Gap

Paul Godley, associate professor of medicine and co-leader of the Urologic Oncology Program, is also investigating racial disparities. His study, funded by the Centers for Disease Control, examined prostate cancer treatment outcomes among Medicare recipients in Atlanta, Connecticut, Detroit, the San Francisco Bay area and Seattle.

“We found that African Americans apparently received less benefit from treatment for early stage prostate cancer with a year and a half less median survival than their white counterparts,” he explains. “Black patients’ poorer overall survival from localized prostate cancer varied by initial treatment, with the survival gap being largest among patients undergoing surgery.”

The study helps clarify a vexing issue about racial differences in prostate cancer treatment outcomes. “Are African Americans with early stage disease doing worse because they present with more advanced disease or because they receive different therapies (more radiation, less surgery)?” Godley says. “The answer seems to be that neither of those two reasons account for the differences in outcomes. This research could provide an impetus for more investigations into the quality of care men receive, their access to care, and the process by which men and their doctors reach treatment decisions.”

A follow-on study will look at whether more-experienced hospitals have better outcomes than less-experienced hospitals. It will also determine whether African Americans disproportionately receive care at less-experienced hospitals, implying that the quality of care accounts for the poorer outcomes of this group.

Creating Better Screening Processes

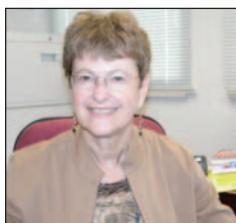
Godley is also working on a controlled study of PSA screening supported by the N.C. Advisory Committee for Cancer Coordination and Control and the American Cancer Society.

“If PSA screening protects from death from prostate cancer, then the screening rates among controls should be significantly higher than the screening rates among the deceased,” he explains.

More than 800 North Carolina men from 50 counties have participated in the study; half the participants are African American.

“The study may help determine whether the strategy of detecting prostate cancer early with PSA testing followed by either surgery or radiation prevents death from prostate cancer,” Godley says. “If the current strategy is not supported by this and other ongoing studies, then patients, primary care providers and oncology specialists may need to develop new ways of detecting early, curable prostate cancers.”

Designing More Effective Therapies

Treating recurring prostate cancer with chemotherapy hasn’t been very successful. But preliminary research led by Raj Pruthi, assistant professor of surgery and co-leader of the Urologic Oncology Program at Lineberger, could change that.

In early stages of a clinical trial, Pruthi found that Cox-2 inhibitors may have anti-tumor effects on prostate cancer and could slow disease progression in men whose PSA blood tests indicate a recurrence. The Cox-2 enzyme is associated with the onset and growth of colon, breast, bladder and prostate malignancies. Using Cox-2 inhibitors (such as non-aspirin pain relievers) could lead to a more effective, less toxic treatment for prostate cancer, too.

The study followed 24 prostate cancer patients in biochemical relapse who were treated with a Cox-2 inhibitor for about a year. After three months, 11 patients’ PSA either declined or stabilized and 11 others experienced a dramatic decline in the rate of PSA increase. Two patients showed no initial change.

As a result, Pruthi thinks Cox-2 inhibitors may help delay or prevent disease progression in men with recurrent prostate cancer after radiation therapy or surgery, delaying the need for hormonal therapy.

About 100 patients will be studied as the clinical trial continues. “Our trial will determine the clinical potential of Cox-2,” Pruthi says, “particularly for patients who’ve been told there are no good treatment options at this time.”

Improving Surgical Treatments

A new, less-invasive surgical treatment for prostate cancer, called laparoscopic radical prostatectomy (LRP), is being used by assistant professor Eric Wallen. Originally applied for gallbladder removal and commonly used for kidney cancer, the proce-

Profile

When Paul Godley isn't investigating health disparities or undertaking research on new cancer therapies and prevention, he can be found tending his 100-bush rose garden, working on his latest photography project or entertaining thoughts of being the next Miles Davis.

"Miles Davis, Trumpeter, Dies; Jazz Genius, 65, Defined Cool.' I think that says it all," laughs Godley, associate professor of medicine in the division of hematology/oncology. "Who wouldn't want a career like that? I'd like to play the trumpet, be a jazz genius and (re)define cool. I'd pass on the drugs and dying at 65 part, though.

"Second choice would be a National Geographic photographer so I'd have an excuse to travel to strange places, eat unusual food, and take pictures of exotic people," the Detroit native adds.

Godley's primary focus at Lineberger is prostate cancer. In addition to working with patients and their families, he helps lead the UNC multidisciplinary genito-urinary clinic/conference where medical and radiation oncologists, surgeons, radiologists, pathologists and others discuss prostate cancer patients. He's also working with colleagues to develop a community cancer network that will undertake research projects addressing cancer health disparities. (For more on this, see our Cover Story).

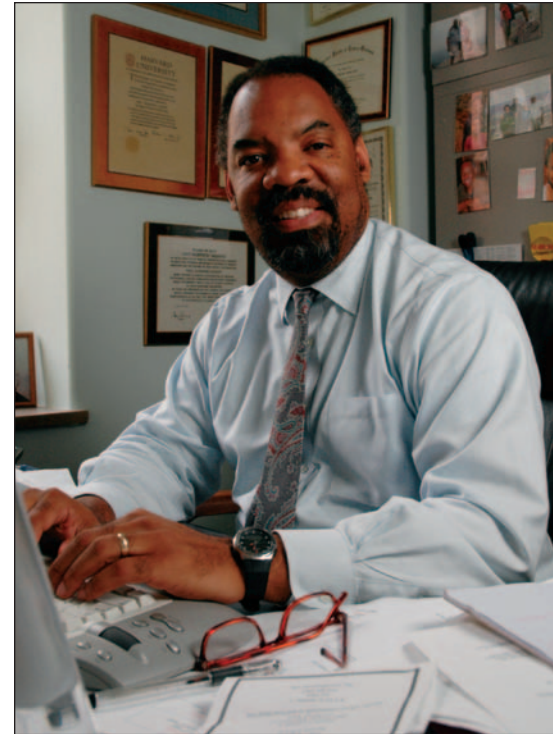
"At Lineberger, I've had the tremendous opportunity to do prevention research, investigate the causes of prostate cancer, design clinical trials and interact with basic scientists, health services researchers, and behavioral and social scientists," he says.

Godley, who graduated from Harvard Medical School and the Kennedy School of Government, got his PhD at UNC in 1996 and then joined the faculty. Despite his other interests, there was never any question of his pursuing a career in medicine.

Both his parents were medical professionals. His father was a general internist with a busy practice in downtown Detroit, building his patient base from the surging African American middle class arising from the automobile industry in the 50s, 60s and 70s.

"My father grew up on a farm in Pantego, North Carolina, which was partly what attracted me to the state," Godley relates. "He never traveled outside of his tiny town until he caught a bus to go off to college. I think he was motivated to excel in school by the opportunity to escape his farm chores. He went to the University of Michigan Medical School, where he met my mother, a nursing student and later an administrator for a Detroit visiting nurse agency."

While Godley thrives on doing good research, he's very fond of patient contact. "I really appreciate running into former patients and family members and speaking with them about their experiences," he says.



"When you are in the middle of caring for patients it can be hard to tell that you are making a difference and because of that it's easy to get burned out. It's rejuvenating to hear patients reflect on how much they appreciated the care they or their family member received at UNC," he says. "A former patient stopped me a while ago and said she remembered me sitting on her bed and holding her hand when she thought she was going to die. Comments like that really rejuvenate you." ●

Institute of Medicine, National Research Council Issue Report on Breast Cancer Screening and Diagnosis

While new technologies hold promise for increasing the accuracy of breast cancer detection, improving access to mammography and broadening the pool of medical personnel who can interpret mammograms offer the greatest potential for immediately reducing the number of lives lost to breast cancer in the United States. These findings were presented in *Saving Women's Lives: Strategies for Improving the Early Detection and Diagnosis of Breast Cancer*, a new report from the Institute of Medicine and National Research Council of the National Academies.

Etta Pisano, professor of radiology, chief of breast imaging, director of the Biomedical Research Imaging Center, and Lineberger faculty member, co-wrote the report. Pisano is an international expert in the use of digital mammography, which provides more specific images of breast tissue than traditional film. More than 200,000 new cases of breast cancer will be diagnosed this year, and more than 40,000 women will die from the disease.

New Aggressive Breast Tumor Subtype Identified at UNC

Chuck Perou, assistant professor of genetics and Lineberger faculty member, discovered a biologically distinct

subtype of aggressive breast tumor. This subtype of estrogen-receptor-negative tumor lacks the only two defined targets for chemotherapy (estrogen receptor and HER2 protein). Thus, the roughly 15 percent of women with this type of breast cancer have a poorer prognosis than women with other forms of the disease.

"It was like looking at a building from the outside," Perou says. "Identifying the patterns of literally hundreds of genes and the proteins they represent lets us walk inside the building and see what's there—and exactly where we could intervene with a treatment."

Perou's lab is known for its use of genomic approaches to classify human tumors and to understand pathways altered within each tumor subtype. He then works to implement these findings into standard clinical practice.

UNC Researchers Identify Virus Gene Involved in Tumor Cell Growth, Spread

UNC scientists have identified a viral gene that switches on cellular genes involved in promoting tumor cell growth and metastasis throughout the body. The K1 gene in Kaposi's sarcoma-associated

herpesvirus (KSHV) initiates these processes by causing cells to secrete growth and invasive factors.

Since there is no cure for herpesviruses, the discovery of this gene's role in the growth and spread of the sarcoma raises the possibility that a treatment aimed at blocking K1's function may help to slow and contain the disease, the research team reported.

"If you target the initiation process, then you might prevent growth and metastasis from occurring," says Dr. Blossom Damania, assistant professor of microbiology and immunology. She is the study's senior author and a faculty member of UNC Lineberger. The UNC research shows for the first time how K1 does this in different cell types, she says. The study was supported by the American Heart Association and the National Institutes of Health. ●

"Roots of Support"

Nine-time Olympic medalist Dara Torres teamed up with the University of North Carolina Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center and the Colon Cancer Alliance (CCA) for a ceremony to pay tribute to people with colorectal cancer (CRC) and their loved ones. Torres and the CCA dedicated a tree to the UNC Lineberger Cancer Center to symbolize the strength and resilience of families affected by CRC, the growth of knowledge in CRC treatment, and hope for the future.

Torres, a former Olympic swimmer whose father was diagnosed with CRC in 2001, has partnered

More Pounds Mean More Breast Cancer Risk

Preliminary results from the Long Island Breast Cancer Study Project (LIBCSP), a multidisciplinary, multi-institutional collaboration to identify environmental risk factors for the disease, confirm that adult weight gain increases a woman's chance of developing breast cancer during her postmenopausal years, and that weight loss may reduce it.

"These data underscore the importance of avoiding adult weight gain as a means of reducing the risk of breast cancer and decreasing the chance of developing other chronic conditions such as diabetes, heart disease and other cancers," explains Marilie Gammon, PhD, the study's principal investigator and a Lineberger member.

"Our analyses from the case-control study confirm that women who gain weight as adults (25 pounds or more since age 20) are at an increased risk of postmenopausal breast cancer," says the professor of epidemiology in the School of Public Health, and deputy director of the Center for Environmental Health and Susceptibility. "Women who have gained more than 30 pounds since age 50 were at a particularly high risk. Further, based on statistical models, we estimated that 44 percent of all breast cancer cases in this population would not have occurred if none of the women was clinically overweight."

The case-control study was funded by the National Cancer Institute and the National Institute for Environmental Health Sciences and in-

cludes over 3,000 residents of Nassau and Suffolk counties in New York State. The goal was to examine whether the risk of developing breast cancer is associated with blood levels of organochlorine compounds or polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbon (PAH)-DNA adducts. Other analyses are still ongoing.

Additional components of the study will focus on survivorship and molecular epidemiology. The LIBCSP survivorship study is one of the first to examine the potential influence of environmental factors on breast cancer mortality. The LIBCSP molecular epidemiology studies include laboratory assays on the biologic tissues collected as part of the parent case-control study to identify susceptibility factors involved in breast cancer incidence.

Says Gammon: "The aim of these studies is to identify genetic factors that may interact with an environmental exposure to impact breast cancer risk and progression." ●

Practical Advice To Reduce Breast Cancer Risk

■ **Practice healthy weight management.** Avoiding adult weight gain can reduce the risk of breast cancer, but even if they have gained, women can still benefit from maintaining weight after age 50 to avoid increasing risk.

■ **Exercise at least 6 hours per week.** Other recent results from the Long Island study show the importance of being physically active throughout life, particularly after 50. The activity does not have to be extremely intense to be effective in decreasing risk.

■ **Eat fruits and vegetables.** The case-control study found that 35 or more servings per week of fruits and vegetables reduce a woman's chance of developing breast cancer, particularly postmenopausal breast cancer.

■ **Investigate aspirin.** Talk to your doctor about new research that suggests that using aspirin may prevent cancer.

ture allows surgeons to achieve the same results as open surgery, but with lower morbidity.

The benefits include lower blood transfusion risk, and shorter hospitalization, Wallen notes. "It also appears to involve less pain in recovery, and a shorter period of disability, although these issues are still undergoing formal evaluation."

Most candidates for open surgery cancer are candidates for this approach—even those with previous TURP, laparoscopic hernia repair, bladder surgery, and rectal surgery.

All treatments for prostate cancer require at least five years to prove their effectiveness, Wallen notes. LRP looks promising. "This technique has now developed a favorable track record in comparison with the standard technique," he says, "and, in experienced hands, is at least as good as the traditional surgery for prostate cancer. In five to ten years, I predict that the majority of surgery for prostate cancer will be done this way."

Helping Patients Make Better Decisions

Making the right treatment decision can be tough for newly diagnosed early-stage prostate cancer patients.

"Since there isn't a universally recommended treatment for prostate cancer, most men opt for the treatment their doctor specializes in without fully considering all their options," says Merle Mishel, Kenan Professor of Nursing. As a result, many patients are uncertain about how different treatments will affect them physically and emotionally. This uncertainty adds to an already stressful situation.

Mishel and Barbara Germino, Blackwell Professor of Nursing, both Lineberger members, are principal investigators for *Decision Making Under Uncertainty in Prostate Cancer*, an NIH-funded study involving 120 Caucasian and 120 African American men with localized prostate cancer. The project will assess the impact of the intervention on outcomes and determine which patients benefit most from the training.

Study participants receive an information booklet and communication skills training video to help them learn more about their cancer and its treatment. They also get telephone calls from registered nurses to answer further questions and review communications strategies.

Says Mishel: "We anticipate that this intervention will improve patients' participation with their physician in decision making and their satisfaction with treatment choice." ●

Seed Grants Key to Novel Therapies. The first link in the laboratory-to-clinic chain is often forged in basic science laboratories. The final links are forged as patients actually benefit from a laboratory discovery. In between, the process is one of continual research and testing to accumulate the data needed to support human trials and to justify major funding. Forging the first link requires venture capital and at UNC Lineberger that venture capital comes in the form of Seed Grants. The Seed Grants Program was begun in 1986 to give researchers the opportunity to develop new ideas and use their findings to leverage major funding from conventional sources.
